THEY'RE BACK!!!!!!!!!!!!!!

I'm sure you know by now that our youth group went on the first ever mission trip to New Hampshire. There were four adults and seven youth who went. They were: Amy Testa, Lynn Jurena, Marilyn Schaffer, John Pflugfelder, Jr., Elizabeth Pflugfelder, Ashley Testa, Ryan Schaars, James Blake, Jessica Randis, Jessilyn Yaeger & Celeste DeMark! What an incredible week we had.

We all arrived at camp with great anticipation and expectations. We had no idea what we were in for or what was expected from us. But we all soon stepped out of our "comfort zones" and got to work! There was so much to learn and so many great things to do, we all quickly learned that this would be an experience not soon forgotten.

We left Panther Valley Ecumenical Ministry as what we thought was your basic youth group, but we came back as a closer and more devoted Youth group. How did that happen?!

Within the next couple of weeks, the youth group will be making a presentation that will explain what they did, what they learned, friends they made etc. They have already been working hard to prepare this for the congregation and we hope that you all will be here to share with the youth group. They are so proud of the work they have done and the lessons they have learned!

As one of the adult leaders, I would like to say to our youth group that I am so proud

Our major projects include running the Lord's Pantry, providing Thanksgiving and Christmas assistance to local families, and supporting our local mission, Carmen Ministries.

The Lord's Pantry provides food for a week to local families who can not make it through the month without assistance. The Pantry is designed to help families in emergency situations, but many families have come to depend on our assistance on a regular basis. The congregation makes monetary and food donations that are vital to the success of this mission. Our "take a bag and shop for the Pantry" has been so helpful in keeping the pantry stocked. In 2003, we had 140 pantry calls. Another major project is the Christmas Angel program. With help from the congregation, approximately fifty local families receive gifts of toys and clothing specifically purchased for the children. Last Christmas, children from Camp Hope and Carmen Ministries were part of this mission project.

Carmen Ministries is a local mission that works with young men involved in the juvenile justice system. Our congregation supports this mission through donations of clothes, food, vehicles, Christmas gifts, Bibles, and

pizza parties at the facilities. The proceeds from this year's Strawberry Festival (\$1,000) went to James Grimes, a young man being helped by Carmen Ministries, for his college education.

Like most of the other commissions at PVEM, fundraising is needed to cover operating costs. The Strawberry Festival is a June tradition, with the funds raised going to a local family or individual in need. In 2003 we gave \$1,000 to the Cameron family.

We have an apple festival in September where homemade apple crisp is sold at coffee hour. Our major fundraiser is the Holiday Bazaar, which will be held November 14th this year. The Bazaar is filled with beautiful and affordable Thanksgiving and Christmas gifts and decor. Homemade linens and gifts are highlighted and homemade lunch will be available.

The commission hopes to see all of the congregation this year at the bazaar.

The Christian Outreach commission meets on the second Sunday of the month after church and we welcome anyone who would like to join us. ❖

Meet Our New Pastor

On July 4th the Reverend Doctor Mary Louise Howson was welcomed as the new Pastor of the Panther Valley Ecumenical Church. Reverend Howson comes from Connecticut where she served as a United Church of Christ minister for twenty years.

While serving at the First Congregational Church in Danbury, Ct., she was active in building interfaith and ecumenical relationships, a perfect match for the Panther Valley Ecumenical Church mission.

The Panther Valley Ecumenical Church held its first service in December, 1969 as an Ecumenical Ministry that included the Episcopal Church, the United Church of Christ, the Presbyterian Church USA, and the Methodist Church. Today's church includes a fifth group called the Covenant Ecumenical Church which exists for members other than the four original groups.

The Reverend Doctor Howson received her undergraduate education from Mt. Holyoke College, a Master's in teaching from Wesleyan University, her Master's in Divinity from Yale Divinity School and her Doctor in Ministry from Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, Georgia.

Reverend Howson's husband, Jim, has just retired from teaching middle school English. His plans include umpiring baseball, and actively engaging in both American Revolution and Civil War reenactments.

Reverend Howson will now lead the covenant in their words "To welcome to our fellowship all people whatever their race, condition, ethnic origin, or religious denomination."

All are welcome to worship at 10:00AM each Sunday, nursery care is provided for your little ones.

The choir practices on Sunday morning at 9:00 AM, before church, and at 11:30 AM, after coffee, until noon.

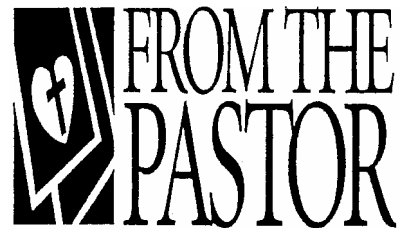
We especially need altos and basses. If you are interested, just come to the choirloft on September 5 at 9:00 AM to practice with us.

SUPERMARKET GIFT CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

This program was established in March 1998 to help the Church underwrite its Operating Budget. It is accomplished by the Church purchasing the Certificates from local supermarkets, A&P, Shoprite and Weis, at a discount. The Church through the Certificate Committee sells the certificates each Sunday from 9:30 am to 10:00 am and 11:00 am to 11:15 am. You can use them at the supermarket as you would use cash, checks or credit/debit card.

ShopRite certificates can also be purchased by you through the Committee who then gives to the Christian Outreach Committee so they can purchase food for the Lord's Pantry. Your purchase is then recorded as a contribution and reported on your giving statement.

What's a COAD and what does it mean to us?

The Warren County COAD (Community Organizations Active in Disasters) is the local chapter of the National VOAD, which was started to give a volunteer backup structure to the professionals who watch over us daily. These professionals are: the Office of Emergency Management, The County Health Department, the local hospitals, the various police departments, the Prosecutors office and several other organizations who will become active in the event of a disaster.

What does it mean to us? PVEM is a part of the volunteer backup and is very active in the organization.

Why are we a part of COAD? Our church is the host to the Northwest New Jersey Spiritual and Mental Health counseling group. We also have a group of professional nurses (Parish Nurses) active in our church as well as a very active food pantry which serves our community.

Who do we have that is involved? Gail Werner is the primary contact within the church and Dr. Ben and Jane Adams, of the Parish Nurses, are active members. Also, beginning in July of this year, I have taken the active role of co-chair of the Warren County chapter.

Anyone in the congregation who would like to take part in this activity is invited to attend the meetings. The group meets on a quarterly basis at the emergency communications building in Washington.

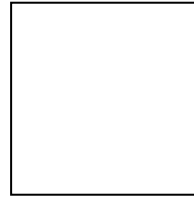
